### Munkfors + Lindsborg = 15 Years



Munkfors, Värmland, Sweden and Lindsborg, Kansas, USA are celebrating a relationship of 15 years as sister cities. The highlight of the anniversary was a visit to Lindsborg from four dignitaries from Munkfors during Svensk Hyllningsfest. The visitors were Mayor Hector Vallejos, Deputy Mayor Bjorn-Olov Hallberg, Director of Education Eva Forsberg and Manager of Tourism Toni Jonsson. The goals of the visit were to recognize the 15 years of mutual partnership between the two communities; strengthen the ties between the sister cities; explore and discuss new opportunities for cultural exchange; explore opportunities for educational exchange; and a sharing of the tourism activities occurring

within each community. Their five days in Lindsborg were filled with sightseeing, Hyllningsfest activities, and meetings within the community. Mayor Neuschafer and her husband Gary, hosted the guests at the Smörgåsbord Friday evening and the Fab Four concert Saturday evening. The contingent also rode in the parade. The Munkfors visitors met with several different organizations to explore deeper communal relationships. Regarding education, the group met with Superintendent Glen Suppes and Curriculum Director Fred Van Ranken. The Lindsborg Swedish Folk Dancers, hosted a dinner in their honor to discuss the dancers' trip to Sweden and Munkfors in 2008. Sunday evening was

filled with dinner conversation of mutual prospects between the two cities. A laundry list of ideas was formulated that each group would review and develop focused efforts for the future relationship. Community residents Inga-Lill Eliason, Don and Maj-Britt Hawk; Marc and Anne Anderson; and John and Margaret Presley graciously opened their homes to host the group. ### Convention VISITORS Bureau



Hello from the new director of the Lindsborg Visitors Center. I am Chris Bauman and am familiar with community promotion having served as the chamber executive in Neodesha, Kansas for the past eight years. Prior to that position, I was in retail for twenty-five years. Yes, we are still located at 104 East Lincoln, but will be operating as the Lindsborg Visitors Center. We are still operating under the same telephone number at 227-3706. Our mission is still to promote tourism and

business development for the community; however our marketing focus is changing. The City of Lindsborg has been working with the Leadership Firm over the last seven months. During that time we have established a formal Convention & Visitors Bureau. A CVB Board of Directors comprised of lodging, restaurant and business owners who have a stake in the promotion of the Lindsborg business community has also been established. The Leadership Firm has also held a series of in depth

conversations through a five page survey process evaluating where the community has been and suggestions on moving into the future. Armed with this information, the Leadership Firm, in cooperation with the CVB Board has produced a marketing plan that has now been reviewed by the City Council. This document narrows the focus of what is being marketed, who is being marketed to and provides for a three year program to measure the progress of these efforts. I have come on

## Fire Safety



Perhaps you didn't know that more people die in fires than hurricanes, earthquakes, floods, or any other natural disaster. Or that every year, children start close to 100,000 fires. October was Fire Safety Month, but planning and practicing fire safety should take place all year-round. Fire safety for children should be a lesson provided by teachers, day-care providers, and parents as a group effort. According to the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA), around 4,000 Americans die in fires and approximately 25,000 are injured every year. The message we want to send is that kids of all ages know about fire safety and that families and businesses are prepared in case of a fire. The Lindsborg Fire Department,

on an annual basis, sets up the "McPherson County Fire Prevention through Education Mobil Training Simulator." Students at Soderstrom Elementary K-4<sup>th</sup> practiced escaping from a burning building/home. The Holidays often bring with them glowing candles, extra lighting, and more plugged in items such as warming trays, decorations which includes extra paper and materials around the home. With this also comes an increased risk of accidental fires in a home or child care setting. Special attention should be given to ensuring that outlets are not overloaded, candles are out of reach of children and are not left burning, and that paper items are not placed in the areas that could be easily ignited. Be aware of fire

safety when plugging in lights and decorations, and as a part of decorating, be sure to add in a reminder to children about fire safety. Remember that anyone's home can fall victim to a fire, and while eliminating fire hazards is one important sign, it is critical to have an escape plan. After all, planning and preparation may save your life or the life of loved ones.

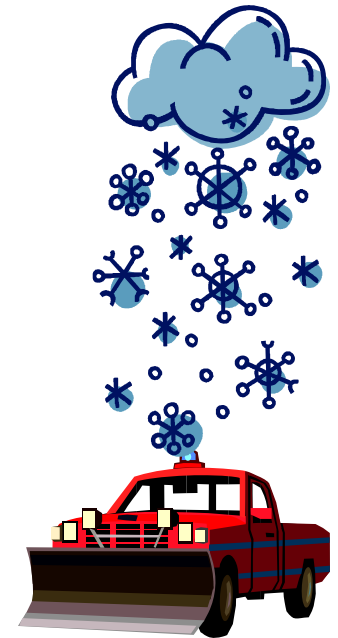
## Snow Season Is Coming

It won't be long until the temperatures drop enough for snow and ice to become a major concern. The City of Lindsborg Snow Removal plan for plowing is as follows:

- If the forecast for snow is two inches or less, no plowing will be done. Sanding will begin when the snow has finished;
- If the forecast for snow is two to four inches, plowing will begin when the snow has finished;
- If the forecast for snow is greater than four inches, plowing will begin at the three inch depth and continue as needed;
- If two inches of sleet fall, plowing will begin.

Major routes will be plowed first, concentrating on the areas around the downtown, hospital, and schools, then radiating out. A recent development has the McPherson County Public Works Department assisting the City with a salt pretreatment of the highways as well as Main, Lincoln and Coronado Streets. Once the plowing is in hand, sanding of most intersections will begin. In addition to what the City does in the event of a storm, homeowners and storeowners also have responsibilities. **Sidewalks must be cleared within 24 hours of the snow stopping.** When cleaning snow off of sidewalks, it is best to pile what you can around the trees. Any excess snow should be piled in an open area that provides at

least 8 feet of clearance. **Snow blowers may blow snow into the street only if the sidewalks are cleared prior to the area being bladed.** Following a heavy snow, we will only blade the downtown area one time so that we can concentrate on the residential areas. Downtown area snow will be bladed to the center of the street. Removal depends on traffic conditions. Light traffic will allow us to remove the snow during the day. If heavy traffic is observed, we will schedule snow removal for either late night or early morning hours. On a final note, if snow is forecast and you have the option, please do not park in the street. This will help to facilitate and expedite the snow removal process.

## Tree Board Information On Scots Pine

The Lindsborg Tree Board is asking all home owners with Scots Pine to please monitor their trees for Pine Wilt. The goal is to avoid losing a large population of Scots Pine in our community. The Kansas State Extension agency recommends that if pine wilt is suspected to be the cause of a tree death, it is important to confirm the presence of the pinewood nematode. Early confirmation will allow the owner to act quickly to

prevent the spread of the pinewood nematode to nearby pine trees. An adequate sample is either a branch sample, at least two inches in diameter, collected near the trunk of the tree, or a wedge of wood from the lower portion of the trunk. The best time to acquire a sample is late summer/early fall due to high nematode populations. Pinewood samples should be placed in a plastic bag as soon as it's

collected and mailed early in the week, preferably by Wednesday. There is a \$10.00 fee for the test. County fees are an additional charge.

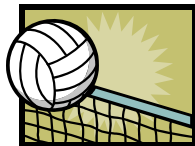
### Coed Drop-In Volleyball
